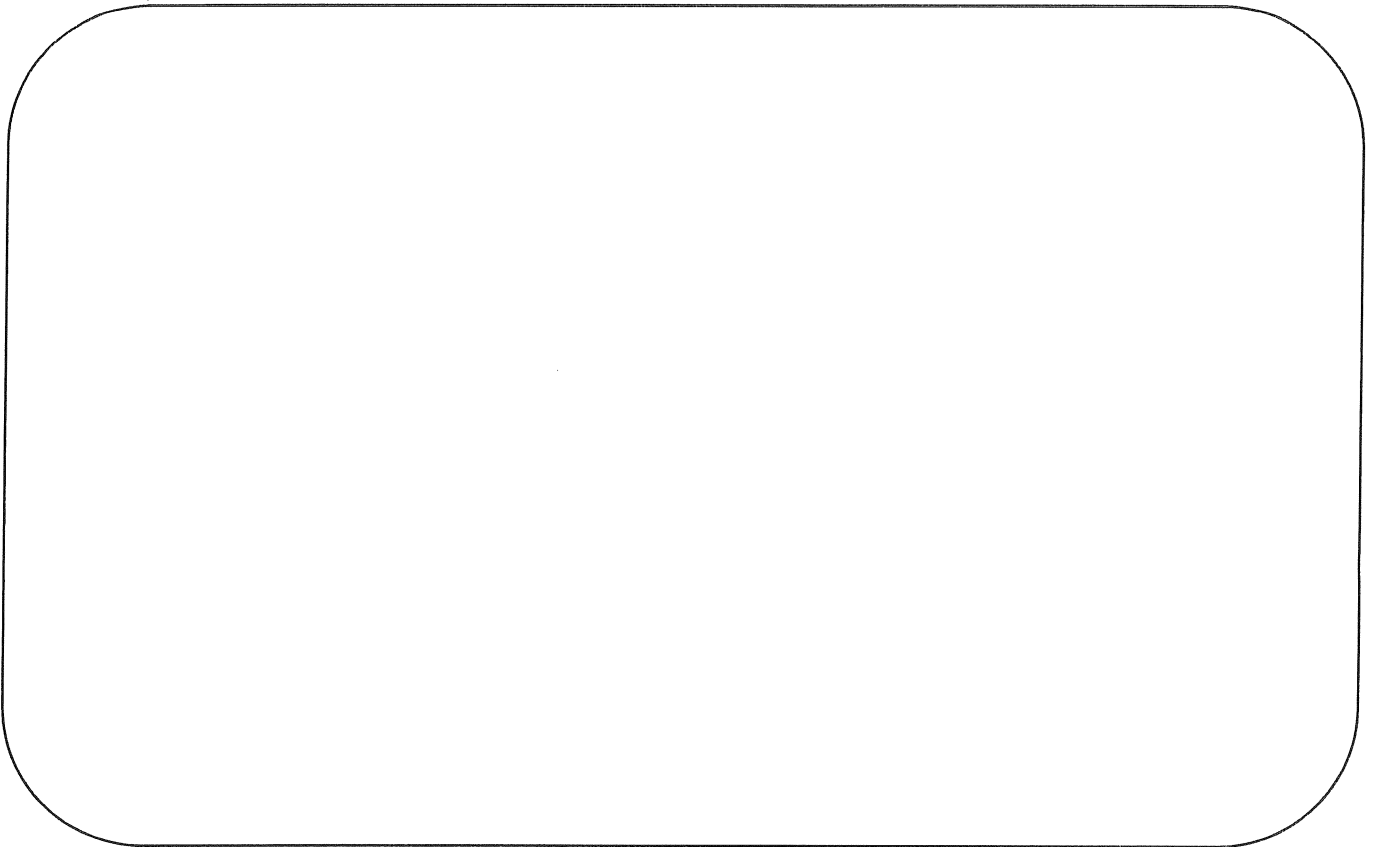


LI: We are learning to describe what characters look like.

- our sentence starters:

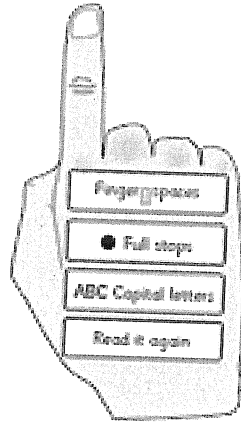
*(character's name)* **has**.....
